About Re:BUiLD

Re:BUiLD - Refugees in East Africa: Boosting Urban Innovations for Livelihoods Development is a multifaceted approach to support urban refugees to build sustainable livelihoods in East Africa and to inspire evidence-based systemic change globally.

In 2021, the **International Rescue Committee (IRC)** with funding from the **IKEA Foundation** launched Re:BUiLD. The Re:BUiLD program is providing solutions and generating evidence and learnings through piloting innovations & responding to urban refugees' needs.

Initially focusing on Kampala (Uganda) and Nairobi (Kenya), Re:BUiLD is working to expand the evidence base on innovative and sustainable livelihoods solutions that can support refugees and host communities in East Africa and beyond.

Re:BUiLD is flexible and adaptive by design, informed by continuous experimentation and learning. Its implementation is tied to a commitment to delivering livelihood services and community-driven market-based improvements targeting 20,000 refugees and host residents in low-income neighborhoods in Kampala and Nairobi.

Udita Aturinzire, a 25-year-old businesswoman, took an unconventional path. Despite her training as a tailor through Re:BUiLD's vocational program, you won't find her stitching away at a sewing machine along Nesereko Road in Nsambya.

Instead, she made a bold move: investing her start-up capital in mobile money back in 2022. Fast forward one year, and Aturinzire is now managing her second mobile money outlet.

Eleni Wendmu Tadese 44, a seasoned entrepreneur, wears multiple hats in the bustling city of Kampala. Her salon and makeup shop are go-to destinations for those seeking beauty transformations. But Eleni’s impact extends beyond her business ventures.

As a Re:BUiLD microenterprise mentor during RCT Wave 1, she generously shared her wealth of knowledge with aspiring women entrepreneurs. Drawing from her more ten years of business experience in Uganda, Eleni guided four women under her wing. Their journey involved diverse pursuits: from catering services to liquid soap making.

“ Under the RE:BUiLD program, we have actively dismantled gender barriers, providing women with opportunities to excel in sectors crucial for climate resilience, including waste management, sustainable agriculture, renewable energy, and green digital skills. Women are increasingly assuming leadership roles and leveraging their expertise to drive initiatives aimed at mitigating climate change impacts and promoting environmental sustainability.

Kazi Kahambu, a determined entrepreneur, operates a second-hand shoe business in the packed hallway of Discount Mall in Kampala. Her journey is one of resilience and resourcefulness. Despite being a single mother of eight children, Kazi knows the value of hard work and strategic planning.

Kazi invested in her shoe business. From five sacks of second-hand shoes, her inventory has now grown to an impressive eight sacks per week. Each sack holds the promise of profit and progress.

“ Re:BUiLD is playing a vital role in encouraging refugee women to adopt the group saving culture and strengthening their position to approach formal financial institutions. Moreover some of the groups are investing in joint income generating ventures such as liquid soap making.

Aminah is a salon business owner in Nansana, a Kampala suburb. Through Re:BUiLD’s partnership with UGAFODE Microfinance Limited, Aminah borrowed capital to transition from a mobile salon service to a shop. In a bit to set her salon apart, Aminah acquired a machine to make dreadlock extensions from braids which she sells to her customers.

“As a project assistant at the Re:BUiLD program, I have been able to impact business skills to refugee women in Urban Savings and Loans Associations (USLA) groups I have also supported to register these groups with the city authorities, and I am currently facilitating USLA linkages to financial institutions like banks.
