# INTRODUCTION

The International Rescue Committee's (IRC) Refugees in East Africa: Boosting Urban Innovations for Livelihoods Development (Re:BUILD) program is pleased to present the year 4 annual report. As we focus on the fifth year of our implementation, we would like to share the progress we have made, learnings, and adaptations from the year ending December 31, 2024. Launched by the IRC and the IKEA Foundation in 2021, Re:BUILD is one of the largest private investments (€30 million) for urban refugee livelihoods in East Africa. By the end of year 4, the program had served 20,732 clients in Kampala and Nairobi.

Throughout Year 4, the Re: BUILD program team has been dedicated to advancing economic inclusion and self-reliance among refugee and host community members in Nairobi and Kampala. This year, we focused on scaling the program's strategic intervention areas, including microenterprise support, Urban Savings and Loans Associations (USLAs), and financial linkages, which have contributed to tangible improvements in economic self-reliance for the communities we serve.

In this report, we highlight the significant milestones, key moments, and program changes that have emerged from our strategic client responsiveness strategy and continuous monitoring of the delivery of our interventions across our three pillars. Indeed, we geared year 4 efforts to document, and amplify client voices, share change stories, and more importantly share learnings and evidence throughout our spheres of influence at local, national, regional, and global.

# **PROGRESS TO END OF YEAR 4**





Borrowing on learnings from year 3, the program identified three areas to scale in year 4

- Microenterprise support where we served 8003 clients
- Financial inclusion where we supported 2961 clients
- We supported 478 clients to advance climate relient livelihoods


By the end of Year 4, the Re:BUILD program had directly served **20,738 clients**, we are delighted that we were able to surpass our 20 000 target by 4%. This included **12,372 clients** who were served in Year 4 of implementation and benefited from a complementary suite of livelihood services and support. This growth was driven by microenterprise support through Randomized Controlled Trials (RCTs), financial inclusion through USLAs, and climate resilience livelihood initiatives implemented during the year.

# FINANCIAL INCLUSION PARTNERSHIP


The Re:BUILD program continued to partner with Equity Bank in Nairobi and UGAFODE Microfinance Limited in Kampala to implement an Loan Guarantee Facility model, an initiative linking urban refugees and vulnerable to financial service providers. Through this intervention, **218 clients (145R, 73H;141F, 75M, 2 Other)** accessed loans totaling **€56,253.** 





### **RE:BUILD SECOND WAVE RANDOMIZED CONTROL TRIALS (RCT)**

In February 2024, the second wave of the Randomized Control Trial (RCT) study launched in Nairobi and Kampala, marking a significant step forward in supporting microenterprises. The study achieved a **99.6% success rate** in its baseline survey and successfully delivered interventions to all participants. All participants engaged in structured networking sessions aimed at strengthening local business connections and fostering peer learning. These efforts are part of a broader strategy to empower refugee and vulnerable host entrepreneurs, build resilient business communities, and generate evidence on what works in microenterprise development.





# SERVICE DELIVERY IN UGANDA

#### PROGRESS ON ENSURING PEOPLE ARE EMPLOYED

#### Kampala Non-RCT Client Assessment – Year 4 Highlights

In Year 4, the program conducted a follow-up survey with 769 non-RCT clients in Kampala who had previously received technical skills training. The goal was to assess their economic performance and engagement in income-generating activities.

## ENGAGING PRIVATE SECTOR PARTNERS

The program also deepened its private sector engagement, creating linkages between refugee and host community youth and potential employers to improve employment opportunities. This effort forged a close working relationship with the Uganda Federation of Employers whereby in its 2024 Employer of the Year Awards, a category was introduced to award the employers of urban refugees.



## CATALYTIC FUND PARTNERS

The IRC Catalytic Fund is a fund allocation initiative to support innovative ideas that show promise of scale to employ refugees and vulnerable hosts. It emphasizes collaboration with local partners. In Year 4, two IRC projects; **Re:BUILD** and **KULEA WATOTO**, in partnership with **JP Foundation** and supported by the Catalytic Fund, trained **67 clients (82% female, 87% refugees)** in baking using local ingredients. As a result, **43 clients transitioned to self-employment**, earning an average monthly profit of **UGX 200,000 - 300,000 (€53 - €79)**, with one securing a contract to train others.



# CLIMATE RESILIENT LIVELIHOOD ACTIVITIES

The program supported over 300 clients in Kampala across three climate-resilient livelihood components.




# SERVICE DELIVERY IN KENYA

# PROGRESS ON ENSURING PEOPLE ARE EMPLOYED/SELF EMPLOYED

The program surveyed 967 non-RCT clients in Nairobi who had previously received skilling support. Results showed that **837 clients (87%)** were actively engaged in income-generating activities, **up from 54%** in April 2023. This includes **496 women**, **339 men**, **and 2 identifying as other**, with **406 refugees and 431 host community members**.

Additionally, **23 refugee clients** were certified by the Kenya National Qualifications Authority (KNQA) in trades such as tailoring, beauty, photography, electrical installation, catering, and barbering—enhancing their employability and income potential.



# ENABLING PEOPLE TO MANAGE FINANCIAL RISKS

#### KENYA

87 new groups received financial literacy training, capacity building, and support for formal registration, improving access to financial services and economic resilience.



#### UGANDA


The program significantly advanced financial inclusion and economic empowerment through the formation and support of 51 USLA groups in Kampala.



# **BUILDING COHESIVE COMMUNITIES, UNLOCKING EQUITABLE** ACCESS TO SERVICES

#### WRAP-AROUND SERVICES FOR WOMEN

Re:BUiLD's wrap-around services in Kenya and Uganda provided holistic support to refugee and host community women through legal counseling, protection awareness, GBV prevention, and economic empowerment. In Kenya, over 1,600 individuals were reached through sensitization on labor mobility, legal rights, and GBV prevention, while 1,400 city officers were trained on refugee documentation. In Uganda, services included legal aid, rights awareness, and participation in the Kampala GBV Safety Audit. These efforts strengthened protection, increased access to services, and promoted safer, more inclusive communities.

# **EVIDENCE AND LEARNING**

### MICROENTERPRISE SUPPORT IN KAMPALA AND NAIROBI

The Re:BUILD program under the International Rescue Committee (IRC), with funding from the IKEA Foundation carried out the RCT (Randomized Control Trial) Wave 1 study to find out the effects of Cash and Mentorship on refugee and host businesses

In Kampala, the study was carried out in collaboration with the Center for Global Development (CGD), Makerere University's Economic Policy Research Centre (EPRC), Innovations for Poverty Action (IPA), Georgetown University, and the University of Rochester.

In Nairobi, the study was caried out in partnership with Princeton University and Georgetown University. The study findings show that Cash grants had a positive effect on refugee and host entrepreneurs and communities while mentorship had mixed outcomes


The findings are presented in Kenya Policy brief, Uganda Policy brief, Research Brief and RCT Wave 1 Uganda working paper.

In February 2024, Re:BUILD successfully recruited a total of **11,568 (Kenya: 4,867; Uganda: 6,701; 42% M, 58% F; 38% H, 62% R)** for the second wave of the Randomised Controlled Trials (RCT). The program initially targeted 8000 (4000 in Kenya and 4000 in Uganda) urban refugees and hosts. Of the 11,568, the **8,105 (4,603F, 3,502M) clients (Kenya: 4,053; Uganda: 4,052)** were randomly selected to participate in the study.

### **PROGRAM MONITORING AND EVALUATION**

The Program sampled 722 clients in a periodic follow-up survey to analyze its performance against the Self-Reliance Index (SRI).

### DATA VISUALIZATION STRATEGY

The program launched the Re:BUILD Dashboard V4 in Power BI with an enhanced user experience and support for data-driven decision-making, featuring a refreshed design for improved insights into program results by the program staff.

### **CLIENT RESPONSIVENESS**


Client feedback was continuously collected throughout the project, reflecting IRC's commitment to Client Responsiveness. This feedback informed program design and delivery, ensuring services were more responsive, appropriate, and effective in meeting client needs in Kenya and Uganda. Feedback was gathered through both reactive and proactive channels such as SMS, email, WhatsApp, in-person interactions, Focus Group Discussions (FGDs), feedback sessions, community meetings, and suggestion boxes.

#### KENYA

- Feedback Volume: 1,013 registry entries + 1,183 in-person feedbacks.
- Top Channels: SMS (691), Website (147), In-person sessions (1,183).
- Client Demographics: 603 Female, 580 Male; 854 Refugees, 329 Host community.

#### UGANDA

- Feedback Volume: 442 cases (270F, 163M, 9 Others; 260R, 182H).
- Top Channels: Community meetings (240), Office walk-ins (81).
- Resolution: 204 addressed, 103 positive, 135 referred.



# **INFLUENCE AND ADOPTION**

On October 15–16, 2024, the Re:BUILD program, in partnership with the IKEA Foundation and the World Bank in collaboration with International Rescue Committee (IRC), Department of Refugee Services (DRS), Nairobi City Council Government (NCCG), Office of the Prime Minister (OPM), Kampala Capital City Authority (KCCA), Refugee & Returnee Service (RRS), UNHCR, International Labor Organization (ILO) and Refugee-Led Research Hub (RLRH) hosted the Research and Policy Symposium in Nairobi to advance refugee self-reliance and economic inclusion in East Africa. The event brought together researchers, policymakers, and practitioners to share evidence and insights on access to finance, jobs, social protection, legal identity, and justice. The symposium fostered collaboration and informed policy dialogue aimed at improving outcomes for refugee communities. [Access the full report here.]



#### KENYA

In Nairobi, Re: BUILD partnered with National Social Security Fund, (NSSF), International Labour Organization, (ILO), UNHCR, and Danish Refugee Council, (DRC) to advance refugee access to social security. This collaboration finalized the Haba Haba initiative, enabling refugee enrollment with a Ksh25 daily contribution. The pilot registered 103 refugees, and ongoing efforts aim to integrate both urban and camp-based refugees into the national pension system, with sensitization activities continuing into 2025.



#### ENGAGING THE DONOR COMMUNITY

Re:BUILD launched and disseminated the donor support paper to key global donors, including USAID, PRM, SIDA, GIZ, FCDO, and the World Bank. The paper highlights progress and insights from the program's work on refugee economic inclusion and was also shared with civil society organizations through the regional livelihood group. This collaborative effort aims to strengthen advocacy and draw greater attention to the needs of urban refugees.


#### KEY MOMENTS AND PUBLICATIONS THAT SHAPED THE PROGRAM'S YEAR 4
